


Reporting changes in payroll estimates

If your payroll changes at any point after you provide the WCB with your annual payroll estimate in February, let us know so you can avoid unnecessary interest charges.

It's important to update your payroll information because your premiums are based on this number. Your premium payments should appropriately reflect your coverage level and be paid for in the year in which you have the coverage. If your payroll increases, your premium and payments will increase. If your payroll decreases, your premium and payments will also decrease. Interest may be added if you underestimate your payroll amount.

Changes to your payroll estimate can be submitted at any time. The quickest and most effective way to submit revised payroll is to email us with your account number at
