

Why did the WCB open a Worker Care Clinic?

A Worker Care Clinic offers an additional option for injured workers seeking treatment following a workplace injury.

Helping injured workers get back to safe and suitable work is one of the key missions at the WCB. A workplace injury can be disruptive to you as well as your family, friends and co-workers. Attending a Worker Care Clinic gives you timely access to a team whose expertise will be key in your treatment and recovery.

Important first steps after a workplace injury are to report your injury to your employer and get the healthcare treatment you need to help you recover. The next step is to start planning for your return to work.

What do I do if I have questions or concerns about my return to work plan?

If you feel your return to work plan is not appropriate or not going well, you have a few options:

- 1) Talk to your supervisor and workplace return to work coordinator first and see if things can be resolved. If applicable, you may also choose to speak to your union or other worker representative.
- 2) Contact your WCB Adjudicator or Case Manager as soon as possible.

Visit a Worker Care Clinic



What is a Worker Care Clinic?

The Workers Compensation Board of Manitoba (WCB) is introducing a **Worker Care Clinic**, a **pilot project designed to enhance your healthcare experience**. Injured workers now have the option of timely access to doctors who have expertise in treating common workplace injuries. **The Worker Care Clinic focuses on treating workers with new or acute workplace injuries such as: sprains, strains, lacerations, fractures, minor burns and foreign bodies in eyes.**

Who can visit a Worker Care Clinic?

If you work in a WCB-covered industry and are injured on the job, you can visit a Worker Care Clinic for treatment.

What are the benefits of going to a Worker Care Clinic?

There are a number of advantages to seeking treatment at a Worker Care Clinic:

- minimal wait times
- access to doctors with expertise on how to treat common workplace injuries
- access to onsite x-ray, casting and splinting services
- timely completion of WCB reports
- communication about your work abilities (what you can do), so that, if appropriate, your employer can provide you with safe and suitable work (modified or alternate duties) when you are fit to do so.

Where is the Worker Care Clinic located?

There is currently one Worker Care Clinic located in Winnipeg. It has ample parking and is located on a major bus route.

Yes. As a worker you have the right to seek treatment with a healthcare provider of your choice. The WCB recognizes first treatment visits with medical doctors, nurse practitioners, physiotherapists and chiropractors.
